Answers:

Patients at all four major hospitals pay for patient entertainment to be delivered at the bedside, through TVs provided by Hills Health Solutions through an analogue Master Antenna Television System.

However, patients in K Block of the Royal Hobart Hospital do have access to free-to-air TV at no cost as this is delivered digitally over Internet Protocol Television.

The daily charge is \$12.50, or \$11.50 for concession card holders. The weekly charge is \$80.50, or \$74.20 for concession card holders. These costs were reviewed in January this year, when Hills Health Solutions introduced a new schedule of rates.

The Tasmanian Health Service is working towards consistent, free access to TV for inpatients across the state. Options for upgrading TV access are considered as part of redevelopment projects.
